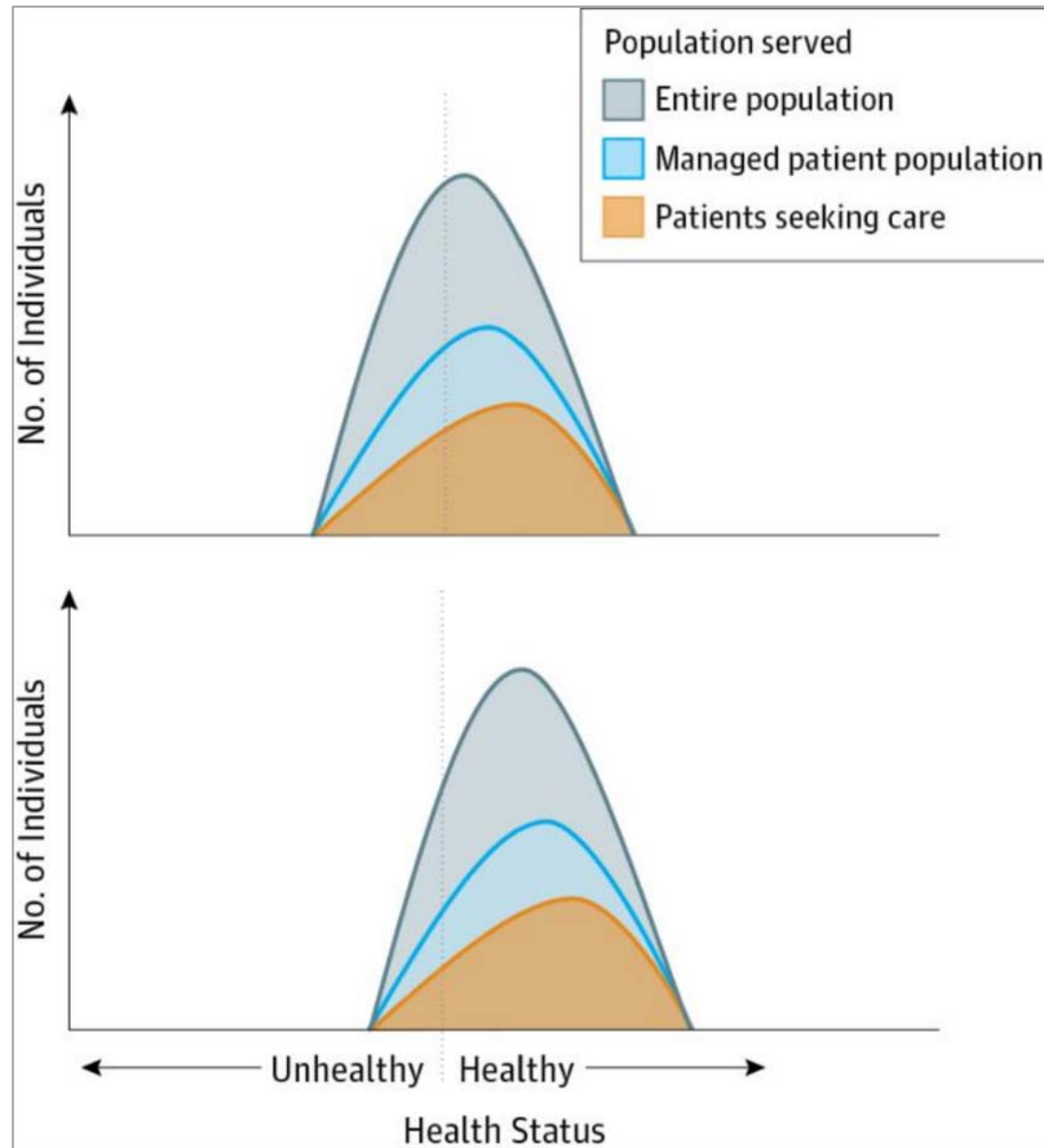

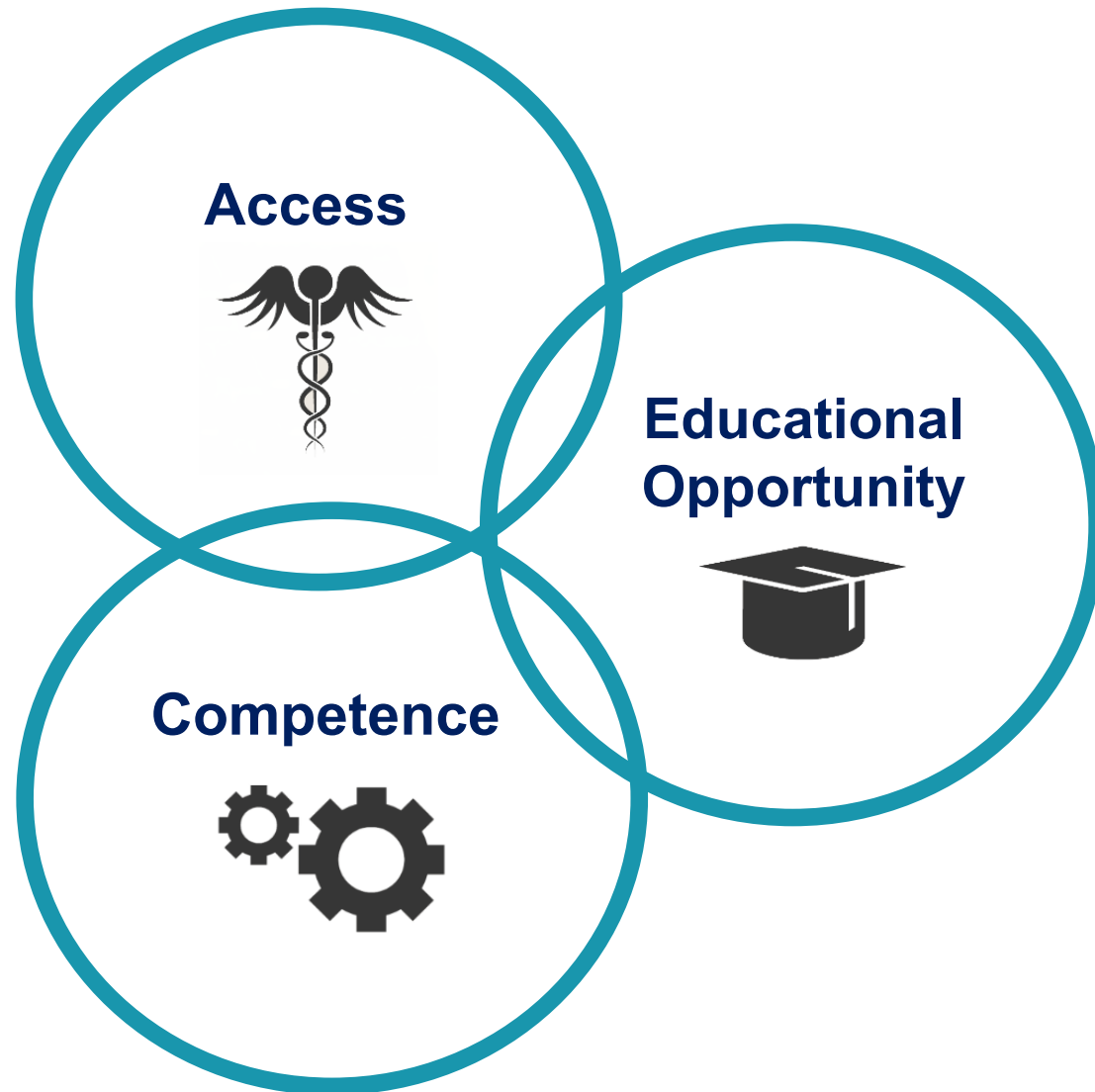
“3 Curves” of Academic Health Systems
